Boal Mansion Concert Series Continues This Fall

After a highly successful series of concerts this past spring, the Museum will hold another one this fall, on Sunday, October 13, at 5pm. This time, the performers will be members of the Allegria Ensemble, Debbie Trudeau on violin and viola and Jonathan Dexter on cello. Please join us for chamber

music as it was originally intended: performed in a private room or small auditorium. The concert is being organized by Amy Gustafson, Music Director for the Boal Museum. It will take place in the Boal Mansion ballroom.

Tickets cost \$40 per person if purchased in advance, or \$45 at the door. If you are a Museum member, you can receive 10% off your purchase: simply enter your member number online or write it on your check.

To purchase tickets, send your check to the address at the end of this newsletter, with "Concert Oct. 13" in the Memo line. The list of those who have purchased tickets will be held at the entrance to the Mansion ballroom; just give us your name when you arrive. Maximum seating in the ballroom is 40 people, so don't wait!

Volunteer Archivist Digs Deeply!

Have you ever wondered what an archivist does? Janice Sherer started out as a docent at the Columbus Chapel & Boal Mansion Museum in 2007—and still guides tours every week—but for the past three years she has spent considerably more time reading, scanning, and captioning the Boal family documents stored in Penn State University's Pattee Library Special Collections, as well as documents in the Boal Mansion. What she has found amazes her and may intrigue you. The Boals, it seems, never threw out anything!

The 99 archive boxes contain, among other things: family letters in English, French, and Spanish; military records from the Great War (WWI), including a 300-page file listing the names of major casualty victims of the 28th Division;



communications from the New York Metropolitan Museum regarding a contested painting that now hangs in the Boal Mansion; legal records, including one recording the purchase of the Boal Estate in 1898 by Terry Boal and his mother Malvina from his first cousin; 30 years of handwritten diaries by Malvina Boal; receipts for everything from expensive jewelry, to laundry sent out while traveling, to a few pieces of candy; and photographs and drawings.

With the help of George Lasek, who joined her efforts in 2018, Janice has worked her way through about a third of the boxes so far. They scan each document into the Museum's inventory, assign some properties (such as location, box, and folder), then return it to its place in the box. Researchers will be able to locate these items using the Museum's computerized inventory when they need to complete the details of an historical paper, for example, or to understand an event in the family's history.


Since beginning this archiving project, Janice has created time-lines for multiple branches of the Boal family, going back many generations and including photos of each family member. These are displayed on large posters in the Boal Mansion's Parlor, Library, and Dining Room, and in the Columbus Chapel, helping visitors understand the many and varied connections over the eight generations who lived in the Mansion.

Before joining the Boal Museum, Janice worked in the Penn State Department of Aerospace Engineering, surrounded, as she puts it, "by really smart kids." She wants potential volunteers to know they're always welcome to join us!

What Can You Do?

Here are some volunteer efforts that may pique your interest:

- » Become a museum docent (tour guide) to share the Museum's history with guests from all over the world. Most docents work from May 1 through October 31, one or two afternoons a week. It takes some time to learn the tours, so plan to start in spring. It's a great job for former teachers or public speakers, but anyone with a clear speaking voice and good memory will do well.
- » Be a greeter at the Visitor Center one or two afternoons a week during our regular season. Take ticket money, introduce visitors to the Museum, and sell books, postcards, locally made jewelry and pottery, and other items in the Gift Shop. Also help keep the Visitor Center in "visiting" condition and add up sales at the end of each day.
- » Maintain structures: carpentry, glazing, plumbing, and other DIY skills are always needed for these aging buildings.
- » Refurbish antique carriages and buggies. If you like working with old vehicles, this is for you!
- We your gardening skills: a variety of gardens need loving care from early spring through late fall. Our director's goal is to develop a "Longwood Gardens"-like atmosphere.
- » Help out with special events! We always need volunteers for our annual events: setting up the Museum's tent, selling food, books, milkshakes, or antiques, selling tickets for tours (and giving the tours if you're a docent), even putting garbage bags in the bins. Every little bit helps.
