### Bob Cameron to Depart as Museum Director

After seven very full and successful years as Director of the Columbus Chapel & Boal Mansion Museum, Dr. Robert D. Cameron will retire April 1. We will sorely miss his amazing energy, brilliant ideas, and tireless efforts to regenerate and promote the Museum!

On January 23, 2022, Bob received the Centre County Historical Society's 2021 John H. Zeigler Historic Preservation Award in Education and Advocacy, an award for which everyone associated with the Museum believes he is supremely suited. He has given so much time and effort (well beyond his formal responsibilities) to educate the public about our Museum, to rediscover, preserve, and display the artifacts of the Boal and Columbus families, and to promote the values in which we—as a community—so deeply believe. ### Autumn Events and Accomplishments

**Trails:** Visitors to our 3 miles of trails took in the fall colors as they enjoyed the rustle of leaves underfoot. During the **United Way Day of Caring** in early October, 250-plus volunteers added fresh mulch to the Outer Loop Trail, painted the Bird Observation Deck and the bridge linking the trails with Blue Spring Park (photo below), and straightened the Old Ticket Booth behind the Chapel.



**Gardens:** September rain produced a myriad of mushrooms, including giant puffballs, some measuring over two feet in diameter! Our formal gardens also benefited from the ample rain as volunteers continued to develop and maintain them. And with the Victorian Greenhouse sections from Rockview State Prison now relocated to the Boal Estate, building plans and fundraising are underway to enable construction of the **Tropical Garden/Butterfly Vivarium** to begin this spring. - » Made headway on the Reflection Garden behind the Chapel
- » Worked on the Rose Garden
- » Raked leaves and mulched beds
- » Weeded the Amphitheater terraces and borders and the nearby Spanish Cross Garden

**Ghost Tours:** To help our friends and neighbors celebrate Halloween, this October we held the first **Ghost Tours of Olde Boalsburg** over four

nights. The event sold out rapidly, was a huge success, and helped raise much-needed funds for the Museum. Tours included details of Boalsburg history along with many local stories of the macabre. "Past residents"



appeared at their grave sites in the Boalsburg Cemetery to entertain tour guests with tales of their lives. Later, "Colonel Terry Boal" met guests near the Columbus Chapel crypt (photo right).

Each tour concluded in the Great Room of the Boal Barn with hot chocolate and a presentation by Springhill Paranormal Investigators revealing their findings of the paranormal at the Boal Mansion.

The Friday tours accommodated almost 40 guests and the Ballroom was filled on Sunday.

### New Tour of Boal Mansion Expanded Exhibits

The unveiling of the Boal Mansion's expanded second floor exhibits reveals a wealth of early 20th-century fashions and displays of antiques, paintings, and memorabilia in three bedrooms, Colonel Boal's office, and two bathrooms, as well

as the Armory. (See separate article, below.) A tour of the second floor is combined with a tour of the recently refurbished **Transportation and Early American Life Exhibit**. There you will find artifacts of early farming life on the Boal Estate, plus restored antique vehicles (carriages, coaches, buggies, and a surrey—with its "fringe on top"), saddles used by the Boal family, and more.

## Major Extension to the Boal Armory

The original Armory on the second floor of the Boal Mansion wasn't large enough to hold all the World War I items that Colonel Terry Boal and his son Pierre brought home with them. Director Bob Cameron and the Armory Committee therefore expanded into an adjoining room. That second room contains, among other items:

- » A huge collection of French and American WWI posters and maps, covering all the walls, with some displayed on stands
- » Gas masks and other civilian and military equipment
- » Numerous medals awarded to both Terry and Pierre Boal
- » Terry Boal's desk from France, with his photos and writing materials
- » Pierre Boal's uniforms from the French cavalry and the American Air Corps

## **Museum Tours and Special Events**

**Basic Tours** include the ground floor of the Boal Mansion, the Columbus Chapel, and the Columbus Exhibit building. These are offered 7 days a week by reservation at 10 am and 2 pm, cost only \$10 for adults and \$6 for students under 17, and are free for Museum members, children 6 and under, and those on active duty in the military. A Basic Tour takes 1-1/2 to 2 hours.

**Extended Tours** cover the second floor of the Mansion (bedrooms, fashions, artifacts, paintings, the Armory) and the Transportation and Early American Life

exhibit. An Extended Tour takes about 2 hours and costs \$20 for adults, \$10 for students under 17, and are free as above.



### Farewell to Art Pentz, Jim Finley, and Pete Ferretti

**Pete Ferretti**, 79, of Boalsburg, died at home on December 24, 2021. For well over a decade, Pete volunteered at the Boal Museum, offering his knowledge of plant behavior, growth, and harvesting. His keen insight was primarily focused on the reestablishment and maintenance of the Museum's various gardens.

He received his BS in Plant Breeding/Horticulture at Penn State University in 1962 his MS in Cytology Cytogenetics/Botany at University of Connecticut in 1966, and his PhD in Plant Nutrition/Plant Pathology in Horticulture at Penn State in 1969. He was professor of Cooperative Extension for Penn State for 37 years, until he retired in 2006.

Pete also volunteered for many years with the Harris Township Lions Club, Our Lady of Victory, and the Boalsburg Village Conservancy.

**Jim Finley** of Port Matilda died on October 2, 2021, aged 72. Jim was responsible for creating the extremely beautiful (and very popular) "Boal Bowls," made from trees that fell or were culled on the Boal Estate. His fellow woodturners continue making the bowls and other wooden items to sell at the Museum's Gift Shop.

Jim completed his BS in Forest Science at Penn State University in 1970, an MS in Forest Resources at PSU in 1975. He joined the School of Forest Resources faculty at University Park in 1981, where he developed research and extension-education programs on sustainable forest management. In 1991, he completed his PhD in Extension Education at PSU.

Jim dedicated his life to promoting the protection, health, and vitality of forests. In 1991, he founded the PA Forest Stewardship education and outreach program, in partnership with the PA DCNR Bureau of Forestry, and coordinated the volunteer program that now includes more than 750 PA Forest Stewards.

Jim served on the boards of numerous foundations and conservancies, and established PSU's Center for Private Forests.

Art Pentz was a frequent visitor to the Boal Museum, most often as a fine photographer. Art died this September, aged 75; we will miss his wry sense of humor as well as his handsome photos, some of which are shown on the next page.

Art graduated from Bloomsburg University with a BA and MS in Speech Language Pathology. He received his PhD in Special Education from Penn State University. He was an associate professor and head of the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders at Oklahoma State University, where he taught and conducted research for 32 years. Art was a life member of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association.

After his retirement in 2014, Art moved back to State College, where he volunteered for Meals on Wheels as well as the historic Boal Museum.
